

One person can't change the world alone, but together we certainly can. And I'm sure we are all aware of the difference that needs to be made. Food and water are running out in the besieged cities. Children are being killed, others are going missing in the chaos of millions fleeing at once. Human traffickers'



prey on the vulnerable who appear with nowhere safe to call home. Homes and communities are being destroyed. **Elie Wiesel, a holocaust survivor**, says this;



"I swore never to be silent whenever and wherever human beings endure suffering and humiliation. We must always take sides. Neutrality helps the oppressor, never the victim. Silence encourages the tormentor, never the tormented. Sometimes we must interfere. When human lives are endangered, when human dignity is in jeopardy, national borders and sensitivities become irrelevant. Wherever men or women are persecuted because of their race, religion, or political views, that place must--at that moment--become the centre of the universe."

As well as our practical support, one of the most important things we can do is to pray. Prayer can change the world through the Holy Spirit, and it can also move our hearts to greater compassion, generosity and love.

Doing our part to aid the crisis is indeed a fitting response to the monthly theme for March "Hear the call for Justice", as we considered the heart of the book of Micah. Vegetarian Recipe

Lentil Lasagne (Economical and yummy!)

Recently I entertained 2 young friends of Amy's. I offered to make mocktails and lasagne. Amy told me that both of her friends were vegetarian, so I replaced the usual 250g of mince with a tin of brown lentils. It was delicious. I think it's best to make the white sauce first.

White Sauce - Ingredients

1 pint milk topped up to 600ml with water 60g butter 60g plain flour Half onion with two cloves pressed in One bay leaf

Method

In a suitable pan, bring milk/water mix to the boil with the onion/cloves/bay leaf. Remove from the heat.

Meanwhile in a largish pan, melt butter and add flour.

Stir and cook over a low heat for a couple of minutes to make a roux.

Pour the milk, through a sieve, into the roux. Stir over a medium heat to thicken. This should take no more than ten minutes.

Season with salt and pepper and nutmeg. Set aside.

While you are stirring, take time to give thanks for everything you have, learn a new Bible verse, or pray!

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

Lasagne sauce - Ingredients

1 cup each of finely chopped onions; celery; turnip; carrot; few cloves of garlic

A tin of chopped tomatoes; A half tube of tomato puree

A cup of water; Teaspoon ground cinnamon

Tin of brown lentils (I got mine in the recently renovated Mosstodloch convenience store.)

Box of Lasagne sheets

(For the 'nose to tail' cooks - cabbage, kale, broccoli or cauli stalks can be used too!)

Method

Heat a really good slug of oil in a solid pan, add the chopped veg.

Soften over a medium heat for 10-20 minutes.

Add the chopped tomatoes, tomato puree, the cup of water and cinnamon. Simmer for half an hour.

Drain the lentils and stir them into the sauce.

Season with salt and pepper.

Set aside.

The next step, although not essential, is a game changer...separate an egg, stir the yolk into the white sauce and whisk the egg white, set aside.

I layer lasagne like this...

In a suitable dish, put a bit of red sauce then a bit of white sauce then pasta sheets and repeat.

It's not an exact science (sorry Sue Pianta-S!) but 2 or 3 layers of pasta is good.

Make sure to leave enough white sauce for the top. Gently fold the whisked egg white into the remaining white sauce and top the dish.

Grate a bit of hard cheese on top if you have or leave plain.

Put in a preheated oven for about 40 minutes at around 180 degrees, or longer at a lower temp.

Why not double up the lasagne sauce recipe and freeze any spare?!

Imagine a wolf type person communicating with a hedgehog, who scared, had put itself into a protective ball. Not easy!

I think I'm more like a tiger, ready to protect my loved ones and at times have an energy that I think and feel is God given. And yet, tiger or not -I so value a hug, a touch of the hand on mine, a smile, a friendly wave.

I think many of us have felt the need for connection during these Covid times.

Having been diagnosed with cancer a few months ago has brought life into perspective and God has given me so many positive messages. Messages and prayers via the Pyjama Prayer Group have been truly felt.

I have also heard and felt His voice. I was in the waiting room in ARI a few weeks ago, waiting to be called in for a biopsy. I was nervous, cold and the place was full of anxiety emanating from me and three other ladies. I heard, so clearly, a man's voice, calm, caring. He said: 'Be still, for the presence of the Lord is with you.' I felt His presence.

The following Sunday, one of the hymns chosen by Seòras was: Be Still for the Presence of the Lord is with you.(the Holy One is here)

Three days later for our Pyjama Prayer Group, Margaret King suggested the very same hymn. Three times in one week???? Oh yes, I heard you, Lord!

By sharing my feelings and experience, I have found that there are so many women out there, who have had, or have breast cancer. I am certainly not unique! I have had some very caring conversations with our local ladies and some good advice for getting through this. John Mc also has had me smiling with positive stories. The support, encouragement and visits have been wonderful, not to mention my family, friends and neighbours.

I am now on my next part of the journey as chemotherapy starts. The journey will be a bit bumpy at times I know. I worked in oncology for four years as a psychotherapist.

So, I am going to take each day at a time, keep praying to have Jesus by my side through this. I have been told that I will probably lose my hair, so am on the lookout for a multicoloured Rastafarian wig!!

I so value the continued support from my church family. There were hugs given and received on the last Sunday before I started treatment. So important- the value of Hugs can't be emphasised too much.

The love and care flowing from person to another can often say more than any words. Hug and breathe and hug and breathe.

Let the friendship of the Holy Spirit in.

OUR KIRK SESSION

The church of Scotland is governed by 3 Courts – the General Assembly which meets annually in May, Presbyteries which meet at different intervals (Moray is monthly, except January, April, July & August) and Kirk Sessions, which also meet at different intervals. Because they are legal bodies, there is a certain amount of 'process' and jargon. They are all public meetings and anyone can attend, but not speak unless asked to/ given permission by the Moderator (Chairperson). The Moderators of General Assembly and Presbytery are selected and approved annually. The Moderator of the Kirk



Session is normally the minister, but not always and not necessarily. An elder, usually experienced and having undergone further training can be appointed to be Interim Moderator of a vacant charge to help the process of finding another minister. Ann Bowie has done this many times. (No charge may 'call' at present because of reorganisation of church

Meetings are officially 'constituted' or begun with prayer and devotion/ Scripture reading and ended by a blessing, often saying the 'Grace' together. This comes from 2 Corinthians 13:14 May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all evermore.

As you would expect, there is a list of those present (called a 'Sederunt' from the Latin for 'they sat'!) and the Minutes are taken by the Session Clerk. The business is itemised on an Agenda and different areas of work and service are reported on by Leaders of smaller Teams, which often have people serving with them who are not elders. An abbreviated sample of the Minute for 13 Jan 22 is below.

Minute of the Virtual Meeting of the Kirk Session 13.01.2022 at 7.00pm

The Moderator, Rev Seoras Orr constituted the meeting by reflecting on... 'Wilderness' as a quiet, still place, away from 'busyness.' ... the poetic language used in Isaiah Chapter 43: "Forget the former things, do not dwell in the past. See, I am doing a new thing! I am making a way in the desert and streams in the wasteland. The wild animals honour me, the jackals, and owls, because I provide water in the desert and streams in the wasteland, ," To add to the poetry of Isaiah, Rev Orr shared a video of Atacama Desert in Chile – one of the driest wilderness areas on the planet, now flourishing because of climate change! ... look to the future and see new things. TRIBUTE TO REV DAVID FERGUSON 1936 – 2022

(Minister at Bellie & Speymouth 1982-2001)

David was born on 19 Mar 1936 in Bellshill, son of a Congregational minister. He loved sports and was good at football, later gaining his 'Blue' from Edinburgh University. But he also enjoyed badminton, golf and hill-walking. He trained as an English teacher, marrying Aileen, a friend from university days. They had sons, Sandy and Iain, and 2 grandchildren, Fiona and Callum. After divinity studies in Glasgow and an assistantship at Possilpark (Glasgow), Tingwall in Shetland became his first charge. I seem to remember he and Aileen (who died just a month before him in Dec 2021) had a black cat called Satan, whom he would go out and call for in the churchyard at night! He had a quirky sense of humour After a busy and successful spell in Crosshill Parish Church in Motherwell, David & Aileen moved to Fochabers in 1982. It might have been seen as an opportunity to take things a bit easier, but that wasn't David's way. Apart from his parish ministry, he served Presbytery faithfully as Moderator and for several years as Presbytery Clerk.

David had real vision. It was during his ministry that Bellie Church Hall was built and opened in 1985 and that the stained glass windows were commissioned and installed in the church. When people worried and doubted where the money would come from, he had faith and always said, 'It will come. It will come.' and it did – and both 'projects' have been a source of great blessing to members and visitors alike. David was instrumental in supporting James Alexander during what was something of a 'golden era' for the Fochabers Fiddlers, arranging trips to Shetland and two tours of the USA, using his 'exchange' churches as bases and contact for wonderful experiences for many young people. He was instrumental too in setting me on the road to the Diaconate. He gladly gave me a folder of his prayers which I asked him for because I benefitted from them in church and thought would be useful in my ministry, which they were! David was a great reader and his preaching and praying were challenging and insightful. We thank and praise God for David's life and ministry.
