
YOUNG CHURCH

<u>OCTOBER</u> - Our youngsters learned about recycling and protecting our beautiful planet, although they already knew a lot about the damage caused through wastefulness and discarded plastic.

We often enjoy lovely food during our sessions, so the children were delighted when they saw the table covered with tablecloths. However, this wasn't a normal session, and instead of food there were lots of empty plastic bottles, sweet wrappers and other disposable rubbish. Imagine their surprise when I asked them to choose something yummy to eat from their table. They quickly pointed out it wouldn't taste very nice which led on to our discussions about many animals being faced with this problem on a daily basis.

The children were then asked to scatter the plastic on the floor and had to 'swim' across the room without touching any of the plastic - quite a challenge, but achieved when they realised they had to go slowly and carefully. The activity started good conversations about how everyone can look after our planet more. Our 'sad world and plastic bottle' picture showed the problem - 'too much rubbish being thrown away instead of being put into the bin', 'wasting food', 'buying cheap, one-use items' to name a few.

as we thought and remembered the 3R's - Reduce, Reuse, Recycle a simple motto we can all use to ensure that future generations have a lovely planet to enjoy.

<u>November</u> - Red poppy images featured largely in our weekly Young Church sessions.



The significance of wearing a red poppy enabled our youngsters to gain an understanding and respect for all those brave servicemen and women involved in and affected by both World Wars and subsequent conflicts. "We will remember them"

- an ideal opportunity to challenge our observation and memory skills!
- # Whilst making paper poppies, we learned that the Scottish poppy is made with four petals. By adding stems and magnetic tape to our poppies, our youngsters felt proud to return home with a Remembrance memento.
- # The Scouts joined us after the Remembrance Sunday Service and added a special dimension to our Young Church session. Joan shared a very poignant poem "One thousand men are walking" written by Joshua Dyer, a fourteen year old teenager.
- # The children recently shared in a mini-style Communion breakfast which explained the significance of the scripture verse

"Do this in remembrance of me."

About half way down the list, Sophie realised she would not have enough money left to buy the rest of the items. I made up the rest of the bill, but it did give Sophie an appreciation that people only having a certain amount of money to spend would have to make the difficult choice of what to put back. She also realised quickly that there was no meat - only a can of vegetables and fruit to enjoy -

and very few treats. We added a few extra items to the trolley for Christmas and concluded our day by dropping the items off at the food bank. They took us to the back shop so that Sophie could see first-hand the racks of simple foods and meet the generous volunteers who were making up the food parcels.

At first glance it looked like a lot. Then Sophie realised **the biscuit and pudding section was empty**. (②!) She was delighted that she had packed some biscuits in her bags and was told they would be going out to someone that very day to enjoy. A very worthwhile, humbling experience and one I know Sophie won't forget.

So please, if you can, remember to add an item or two especially for that section of the food bank over the Christmas period.

Rev Stuart Duff retired from Birnie & Pluscarden l/w Elgin High on 31 Oct; Rev Alastair Gray demitted his

charge at Keith: North, Newmill, Boharm & Rothiemay on 30 Nov; and after a long illness Rev Barry Boyd will retire from Forres: St Laurence on 31 Jan 2020. That will take Moray to 9 vacancies (nearly 50%).

Remember all the ministers still in post, doubling up on responsibilities and retired 'servants', worship groups and Kirk Sessions standing in the gap, especially 'our own' Rev David Whyte, Margaret King and Colin Hanover. But Good News! – Rev Dr Jacobus (Jaco) Boonzaaier (ex South Africa) was inducted to Findochty l/w Portknockie on 28 Nov.

May he and the congregations see much fruit from serving their communities together.

NEWS - from December's Life & Work

*** The Moderator Designate to the 2020 General Assembly is the **Rev Dr Martin Fair of St Andrew's Parish Church, Arbroath.** In an interview for Life & Work, he said,

We need to be much more creative in sharing our message, and we do that by understanding our role nowadays is about serving. If we want the right to speak about what Christianity means, we have to show what it looks like in practice.

Dr Fair intends to use his year in office to highlight issues around addiction and mental health.

*** Remember our current Moderator, Rt Rev Colin Sinclair, as he continues his duties. From his Advent article: His year thus far has been a 'unique, intense, exhausting privilege'. However you need markers to keep your focus clear and remind you of what really matters. Advent is one such season ...it stops us in our tracks and asks us to tune in to another agenda which matters more than ours. Jesus came to reveal God to us, to keep us company, and help us find forgiveness, strength and direction. That doesn't seem to me to be a bad set of Christmas presents. Happy Christmas!
