<u>Recycling</u>:- Thank you for your continued support using the Rag Bag container, (Green container situated at the playing fields in Fochabers). It has been getting emptied on a fairly regular basis which helps increase funding coming to the church.



The Eco team is arranging to start a new recycling system in both churches. We are going to use "Recycling for good causes". We will be able to sign the church up and items sold on, will again raise funds. It will increase the items that we will be able to recycle. We will have a cardboard box for each church and details will follow with the items that can be recycled. So be on the lookout for the boxes in the near future.



<u>Food Bank</u>; Over the summer we have noticed with holidays and worshipping in different churches there can be a slight decline in the food coming in to the food bank. So just as a reminder if you have items there is still the box at the door of Bellie and a collecting point at the back of the hall in Bellie. If items come in while we are worshipping at Speymouth if you could give them to Avril or Ann Raffan or anyone that is likely to be up in Fochabers. We still will be collecting over the summer period. Thank you for your donations.

<u>Toilet Twinning</u>; What is it? It is a scheme to raise funds to enable people living in poor communities to have clean water, a basic toilet, and to learn about hygiene – a vital combination that helps end generational poverty. Around a third of the world's population have to use fields, streams, rivers, railway lines, canal banks, roadsides, plastic bags, or disease-breeding buckets. 2.3 billion people don't have a loo.

Well the good news is Bellie and Speymouth are going to toilet twin, which means we are going to donate towards a toilet in one of the countries in most need. We will receive a framed certificate as a reminder that we have twinned. So again look out for our toilet twinning in the near future. More information is available at www.toilettwinning.org including how to go about twinning your own toilet at home.

<u>Eco reps</u>; - We are also going to contact the different church groups and ask them to nominate a person to liaise with the Eco Team. It is not a big thing it is just if another group wishes to do something and wants to know where we stand from an Eco point of view.





The recipes are still from the Vegetarian night. If anyone has a good vegetarian recipe that they wish to have printed please let the Eco Team know.

Soda Bread

Ireland's most famous bread is made with two of the oldest foods, wheat and buttermilk. The acid in the buttermilk reacts with the bicarbonate of soda and creates the rise. Great to teach children because you can have bread on the table within 45 minutes.

<u>Ingredients</u>; - 250g plain white flour, 250g wholemeal flour, 1 tsp salt, 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda, about 400ml buttermilk.

- 1. Heat the oven to $200\,^{\circ}\text{C/gas}$ 6. Line a baking tray with parchment.
- 2. Put the flours, salt and bicarbonate of soda into a large bowl and mix well. Make a well in the centre and pour in half the buttermilk. Mix the flour into the milk then continue to add

the milk till you have a sticky dough. You may not need all the milk it depends what flour you use.

- 3. Tip the dough on a lightly floured surface, shape into a ball and flatten it slightly. It is important to work quickly, as once the buttermilk is added it begins to react with the bicarbonate of soda.
- 4. Put the dough on a baking tray. Mark into quarters with a large sharp knife, cutting deeply through the loaf, almost but not quite through to the base. Dust top with flour.
- 5. Bake for 30 minutes or until the loaf is golden brown and sounds hollow when tapped on the base. Leave to cool. Eat on the day of baking or toast the next day.

Lentil Ragù

Ingredients; - 3 tbsp olive oil, 2 onions, finely chopped, 3 carrots, finely chopped,

3 celery sticks, finely chopped, 3 garlic cloves, crushed, 500g bag dried red lentils,

2 x 400g cans chopped tomatoes 2 tbsp tomatoe purée 2 tsp each dried oregano and thyme,

3 bay leaves, 1 litre vegetable stock, 500g spaghetti

Parmesan or vegetarian cheese, grated, to serve.

Method; - 1. Heat the oil in a large saucepan and add the onions, carrots, celery and garlic. Cook gently for 15 – 20 minutes until everything is softened. Stir in the lentils, chopped tomatoes, tomatoe purée, herbs and stock. Bring to a simmer, then cook for 40 – 50minutes until the lentils are tender and saucy – splash in water if you need. Season.

2. If eating straight away keep on a low heat while you cook the spaghetti, following the pack instructions. Drain well, divide between pasta bowls or plates, spoon the sauce over and grate on some Parmesan cheese. Alternatively, cool the sauce and chill for up to 3 days. Or freeze for up to 3 months.

Simply defrost portions overnight at room temperature, then reheat gently to serve.

WORSHIP TEAM



Each Sunday we are richly blessed with the attendance of our Young Church members. The children are a very important part of our Church Family and their eager involvement adds a very special dimension to Worship.

At the start of each month, they look forward to "helping" the Congregation with the "Guess the Mystery sound" challenge. This challenge really makes us all listen and encourages great participation – much laughter accompanies our various answers! Our monthly themes of Unity, Prayer, Joy and Generosity have all been introduced through the mystery sounds. Why not challenge your memory and see if you can you remember which of the following sounds represent each of our Themes – a smile; (yes, a smile CAN speak volumes!) a fountain of water; magnets sticking together and a water drain bubbling forth from under the pavements.

Action songs also feature largely in our Services and the children appreciate the fact that the "older children" also join in! It appears that the Congregation have just as much fun as the children judging by the many happy smiles!

Occasionally, we have the added pleasure of a cuddly soft toy attending our Services – yes, you've guessed - Hamish, the highland cow! The children (and adults) love watching the funny antics of Hamish and Rev. Seoras as they convey a particular message through role-play.

P.P.S. Hamish is feeling very proud since hearing that the new polar bear at Kingussie Wildlife Park also shares his special name!

After the All-Age talk, children's hymn and prayer, our youngsters now have a particular highlight before continuing their learning through in the Church Hall. (Do look out for the high, low and in between "high fives" with Rev Seoras!)

We have recently adapted the Sunday Club programme allowing time for the Young Church Team to re-cap and extend the particular focus during each month. Stories, prayers, hymns, action songs, drama, crafts, baking, planting seeds are just some of the many activities available for the children. It is very rewarding to see our youngsters (from pre-school to P.4) working together so harmoniously, all the time expressing their thoughts and ideas so openly.

We have also extended the number of our Young Church Team which allows the youngsters from P.4 upwards to benefit from more "in depth" Bible discussions.

During school holidays, mid-term and long weekends, we usually have all-age sessions which prove popular and beneficial for all concerned.

We also celebrate special Church events with Family/United Services - Easter Sunday (in the form of Cafe Kirk) being such a joyous gathering. Finding the last Easter Egg hidden in the Church proved quite challenging for the children but just as in the Easter message, they triumphed!

During the month of May, the Theme of Generosity allowed us to reflect on how our different gifts benefit and bring joy to others. You may remember that Sunday Club members started sponsoring Faith, a young girl who lives in Kenya, at the beginning of 2018. We chose to sponsor Faith through the Christian Charity, Compassion, which is a leading international children's charity. Faith is four years old and our sponsorship will pay for school fees and uniforms, medical supplies and nutritional support.

Since comparing Faith's daily living conditions with our own, the children are learning that our prayers and practical support will help improve Faith's life. During Lent, each child/family received a tube of smarties to enjoy (yummy!) with a suggestion of filling the empty tubes with 20 pence pieces - one smartie tube holds £12 - amazing! In addition to our weekly Sunday Club Offering, any £12 tubes will make a huge difference to Faith and her family. We extend grateful thanks to all families for supporting this worthy cause and will keep you updated on feedback from Faith (via Compassion)

Although the weekly Offering and smartie tubes offer financial support, our relationship and friendship with Faith includes regular correspondence through cards and pictures. A bouquet of coloured flowers designed especially for Faith is meantime en route to Kenya.

Sharing is very much evidenced in our Church Family be it with prayer, time, talents, money, care and concern for one another and it is very encouraging to witness the various practical contributions from our younger members.



Very many thanks to all who supported us at the DAFFODIL TEA on 8th April, which raised around £740 for church and Guild projects.

Despite falling numbers at Guilds, the amount gathered nationally for the 6 Guild projects over the 3-year programme strategy, 'Be Bold, Be Strong', has reached **nearly £690,000!** [See figures below]

And, as has often been the case over the last decade or so, difficult and contentious matters have been highlighted and picked up on by government and society in general. This past 3 years, lives have been transformed as young girls, parents and tribal leaders in Kenya, and elsewhere, were encouraged and supported <u>not</u> to have, or insist on, FGM (Female Genital Mutilation).

Onwards & Upwards

We look forward to unpacking our new strategy for **2018-2021**, **ONE JOURNEY**, **MANY PATHS**, and to SEEKING THE WAY (2018-19 theme) with the 6 new projects and partners supporting the wider work of the church in the world.



If I could travel anywhere in the world it would be to...Italy as my last visit wasn't long enough to see all the sights and architecture.




