75 new homes nearly ready for residents in Mosstodloch, on Stynie Road on the right as you head for the Red Kirk...






The Sand Piper barbecue and picnic spot in the woods down from the Fochabers Cricket pitch. The river was running high after the snow in February.

BB Companies are currently continuing to engage with children and young people through use of virtual session and our 'BBatHome' activities. We are also providing further training for leaders on running virtual sessions, which obviously has its own challenges with children and young people spending so much time online at the moment, including for school, and the real challenge of 'zoom fatigue'

However, in these incredibly difficult times, the contact and the opportunities that we can still offer to children and young people, whether virtually or through BBatHome, do provide some structure, continuity and fun in their lives at a time when it is surely needed more than ever.

The second wave of the pandemic is hitting Malawi in a big way. They are suffering with the South African variant and



this is proving more deadly than last year. Two Cabinet Ministers and two senior civil servants have died which is tragic because there are few enough experienced and well-educated candidates for leadership positions.... More locally for us, Covid is spreading in Mzuzu and two lecturers in Mzuzu University have died - again a great loss. I spoke with a minister friend, Stephen Bota, last week and he said, "I am conducting funerals every day at the moment".

Our Farmers -As we enter the final few months of the Guild Project, we are encouraged to see ... we have passed the 300 pump mark, with 302 pumps now in use. This is a great achievement. In addition, some of the pumps are shared between farmers so we have 356 farmers benefitting from the project... We would love to get 400 pumps in the hands of farmers by the end of the Project.

Thank you for all your continuing support: it is very much appreciated and a great encouragement to us. These are difficult times in Malawi, but with your help and prayers, we really are making a difference.

Growing a Shared Future - Planning our Future Together with God

Huge change is afoot in national, Presbytery and local church families. It involves considerable 'pruning' and an encouragement to **focus on the church's ministry which is a participation in the ministry of Jesus Christ.** Jesus' ministry was *rooted in and focussed on mission. It is captured in the phrase, 'As the Father sent me, so I am sending you'*. John 20: 21. 'Presbytery planning' is one of the insrtuments which the church uses to help us effect and navigate the necessary change. (The pandemic has also been an instrument in God's hand to speed up the change, like it or not, ready or not!)



Although some changes may not affect us as individual congregations, some of it will and it is part of good Christian education and stewardship to take an interest.

The initial Presbytery Planning Team of Rev Jenny Adams (Convener), Rev Wes Brandon - Buckie S&W with Enzie, Alistair Farquhar - Birnie & Pluscarden, and Fiona Simpson - Keith St Rufus, Botriphnie & Grange came up with the excellent strapline. The Team was expanded in Dec 20 to include Rev Jaco Boonzaaier - Findochty with Portknockie, Rev Andrew Kimmitt - Aberlour and 'our own' Ann Bowie.

The first PPT sent out an information-gathering Questionnaire to which our Kirk Session answered the following

1) What other denominations & fellowships are present in your communities?

St Mary's Roman Catholic Church; Gordon Chapel Episcopal Church; Moray Coast Baptist Church

2) What other networks of belonging are significant for people in your area (beyond where people live)? For example: major employers; industries such as oil, fishing, farming; leisure activities, ...generational networks...

For a set of small communities, there are a significant number of cafés, shops, pubs, takeaways, hotels and other small businesses. Many community groups operate to improve the local area and run events, such as the Maggie Fayre, Speyfest, Fochabers Heritage Centre, Community Councils, and so on. All of this means that there is an established sense of community where many are involved and invested in where they live.

Examples of major employers – Baxter's, Gordon Castle Estate and Walled Garden

Key industries - Food production; Hospitality/tourism; Estate work; Farming

In terms of leisure:

The 'Speyside Way' runs through the parish; 2 mountain biking sets of tracks;

- 'Spey Bay' and 'Garmouth' Golf courses; Fishing on the river Spey

- Dolphin Centre at Spey Bay; Spey Bay Wildlife Preserve

Speymouth would average about 12-15 with the number rising to 20 for Communion.

6) Where do people come from to gather in your church buildings?

The parish contains several villages, all of which are represented in our church family: Fochabers, Mosstodloch, Garmouth, Kingston, Spey Bay, Clochan, Bogmoor, Dallachy, as well as smaller crofts and farms. We also have a small number of worshippers who travel from Elgin, Portgordon and Buckie.

7) What are the transport options for people in and around your communities?

Most worshippers either drive or walk to the 10am Bellie service, as there are limited bus options on a Sunday morning. Nearly all worshippers at the Speymouth Service drive there as there is no footpath leading to the church building.

EXTRACTS FROM THE PRESBYTERY PLANNING TEAM REPORT – MARCH 2021

The PPT encourages all congregations to pray for God's mission in Moray and for the planning work we must all engage in to best enable mission into the future.

The final outcome of the PPT's work will be a proposed Presbytery Plan which will indicate the number, nature and pattern of charges and all other appointments, and the number and location of buildings, which the Presbytery considers necessary at the end of a ten year period....It is important to recognise the distinction between the formation of the Plan and its implementation... that implementation will probably be undertaken within the new larger Presbyteries...[For Bellie & Speymouth this is likely to be the proposed new North East & Northern Isles Presbytery comprising currently of Shetland, Orkney, Buchan, Gordon, Kincardine & Deeside, Aberdeen presbyteries and the majority of Moray charges.]

The PPT hopes to undertake their work open to the movement of the Holy Spirit, who inspires ministries and mission in the communities and

congregations of Moray. The Team hope for open communication and two-way conversations with congregations who already know and serve their communities.

The most recent trends indicate a future target number for all ministry posts across the country in 5 years' time to be around 600, a reduction of around 40%. For Moray, this would mean an estimated approximate allocation of 12 posts (Full Time Equivalent) by 2025. This will be a matter for the General Assembly in May 2021...[Currently Moray has 14 ministers in post and 5 vacant charges]

The PPT, along with the whole Church of Scotland, recognises God's call to and the ministries of the whole people of God, so planning for ministries and mission is not limited to, or by, the number of paid posts.

The PPT encourages all members of Presbytery to prayerfully consider what possibilities there might be in your area, and to engage with each other to explore possibilities for the future.

God, Vine-grower, True Vine, Spirit of Life, across Moray, help us to grow together, discerning and planning our future with you. Help us to remain joined with you and to accept wise pruning, so we might share the fruit of your love more widely. Amen.

The Seawater Greenhouse Company has created amazing new "cooling houses" for places like Somaliland and other African countries that lack fresh water. Much of the remaining fresh water evaporates inside the structure, which becomes a humid place where fruit and veg can flourish! [How clever is that?!]

<u>Iraq</u> – Scriptures are accompanied by basic relief items for Christian families living in Baghdad. May the Lord be with believers living in such difficult and dangerous situations...

<u>Peru</u> – *Share Hope, Give a Bible* encourages Christians in Peru to share God's Word with their friends so that those facing health concerns from Covid-19 may experience new life and hope.

Braille and Sign Language Bibles are being produced for the blind and deaf. Children's Bibles and Study Bibles are being produced for young people and their families, for pastors and church leaders.

Through *Living Water Adopt-A-Child*, the Guild support a little boy, Juan, in <u>Guatemala</u> (and Editor supports a teenage girl, Renata, in <u>Albania</u>). SUMMARY OF GEORGE MURDOCH TRIBUTE sent in by Grandson Chris Campbell



George was born in May 1925 and grew up in Bucksburn near Aberdeen. He worked in agriculture at Craibstone after leaving school before moving to Knockando in 1950. He married

his wife Dorothy in October 1953 and they had 2 daughters Marjory and Dorothy. The family moved to Dallas in 1958 and finally to their long term home in Mosstodloch in 1969 when George started working as Fruit Farm manager at Baxters and became known as the "man from the berries". George also ran a small hobby farm with sheep and cattle grazing in the field behind their home.

Father in law to Sid and Gordon, George was also a much loved grandad to Chris, Lee, Ross and Craig, great grandad to Chloe and Lewis and uncle to many. The family were delighted when James Alexander wrote a waltz "Special Years" in honour of George and Dorothy's Golden Wedding anniversary in 2003. The family enjoyed gathering for various celebrations right up to shortly before Dorothy passed away in 2018.

George's passion throughout his adult life was Scottish fiddle music. After attending fiddle making classes following his retirement in 1991, George enjoyed playing the fiddle he made as part of the Elgin Strathspey and Reel Society. This saw him playing in various local events, as well as a trip to Denmark. George also played the accordion and was very active in the Forres Fiddle and Accordion Club, as well as playing locally with the Milnescroft Speysiders. He

also played in the group providing music for the Old Time Dancing in Speymouth Village Hall every month. Both George and Dorothy enjoyed the Speyfest music festival, with George himself playing in some concerts in the early years. George was delighted to see his passion for playing the fiddle taken up by his great granddaughter Chloe, who will enjoy playing the fiddle he made when she is older.

George had a keen interest in gardening and enjoyed spending time in his own garden, and others'. His topiary efforts with the hen-shaped hedge in the front garden became something of a tourist attraction for those passing through Mosstodloch on the bus. A stereotypical Aberdonian and growing up in the wartime years, George was a champion of the values of thrift and would never throw things out. Indeed, when family members would throw stuff out for him, it would re-appear in the house a few hours later! George was quite shy and reserved, except when it came to heckling the wrestling on the TV!

Both George and Dorothy were very active within Speymouth Church, with George serving as an Elder for many years and Church Officer/Beadle until he started caring for Dorothy after her stroke in 2008. She moved into the Balhousie Care Home, Huntly in 2013, where he eventually had to join her in May 2017.

Whilst George's passing brings great sadness, he had a long and happy 95 years and it is a comfort that he is once again re-united with Dorothy.

SUMMARY OF TRIBUTE TO WILL ANDERSON

Will was born near Elgin on the 14 October 1929, one of five children. His first decade was mostly spent confined to bed with asthma, which prompted the family to move to the coast near Spey Bay at the start of WWII. It was thought the sea air would help his condition. Will developed a love of reading & literature which stayed the rest of his life.

He went to Mosstowie and then Fochabers School. As a teenager, his health drastically improved and he joined the Tynet Rosebuds — a football team comprised mainly of farmers, but who also played cricket. On one memorable occasion, he bowled out the leading batsman of the more established Fochabers cricket club! Another match at Buckie High

School was snowed off, so instead they had a huge snowball fight – no winner - but a window of the school building was smashed! Will also played golf & badminton .

Will followed his father into farming. In 1966 he married Betty, and they had 2 sons, Euan and Les, who enjoyed growing up on the farm with lots of sport and general goofing around. Will's farming meant trips to marts at Cornhill, Keith, Dufftown, Elgin, mostly gone now. Trips north to buy sheep became family holidays, staying at the hotel in Helmsdale; while holidays to Falkirk to see Will's sister May and the cousins seemed like a trip to the big city!

As Will was one of 5, and Betty one of 6, lots of

family came to enjoy the fresh air and hospitality at the big Upper Auchenreach Farmhouse, especially at Hogmanay. Betty, whose first husband had died tragically, was still very close to the in-laws from Guernsey, who became like a third family to Will and would stay also.

was a long-standing member of Spey Bay golf club. After 65 years and a joking remark, he was finally made an honorary member! He was a member of Mosstodloch Bowls club and the Spey Bay Indoor Bowling club where he was the match secretary. He won competitions of all sorts & had heaps of trophies.

Les and Susan gave them their first grandchild, Rebecca, in 2004. Sadly, Betty died in 2005, but at least was a grandma for that time. Ross came along in 2006 and Will greatly enjoyed being a grandad.

When Will retired, the family moved to Mosstodloch, where he was very much part of the community, with

many friends, especially Ian Grant, who was not just a good pal, but a great help to him.

Highlights in the family calendar were the big birthday gatherings. They would hire a large house for a week of music, good fun and drink, and quality family time. When Will turned 90 he wasn't going to have a party but was convinced otherwise and thoroughly enjoyed the celebration at Spey Bay golf club.

One quirk of his that stood out for his boys was his morning porridge. Many have porridge to start the day, but Will was the only one they knew who would add the last nights' leftovers to it. Crab, prawns, asparagus, mince ... all at some point made their way into the breakfast porridge!

Will lived life to the full, including being a faithful member of Bellie Church. He will be missed by family, friends and all who knew him.
