# KIRK NEWS

Dear Friends,

I was interested when watching the World Athletics championships from London recently when Brendan Foster the athlete and sports commentator was being interviewed about his retirement. During the interview he said that he wanted to take time to walk the Camino de Santiago which is a popular pilgrimage trail to Santiago de Compostela in Galicia in North West Spain. It is a walk I have long wanted to do, or at least a part of it so that I can experience the pilgrimage and, of course, receive the 'Compostela', the certificate to prove that I have walked at least 100 km of the walk. This is only issued if you can prove you have walked the route and if you have had your card, 'credencial', stamped with the official stamp of each of the towns along the 'way'. The most popular and the shortest route is know as the 'French Way', a 6 day walk that goes from Sarria in Galicia to Santiago a distance of about 115 km and maybe Jan and I will get around to making the trip one day before the old legs give out completely.

The Camino de Santiago is also known as the Way of St. James who the New Testament tells us was a son of Zebedee and the brother of John. Brothers who were called by Jesus to be amongst his earliest disciples. Legend has it that James took the gospel to Spain and that his remains are buried in the cathedral in Santiago de Compostela. However, Acts chapter 12 also tells us that James was executed by Herod so it seems unlikely that he was a missionary to Spain. Nevertheless the Camino has been popular as a way of pilgrimage for many centuries, especially in the Middle Ages. Although in those days pilgrims would walk from their own homes from all over Europe covering many hundreds of kilometres and taking many weeks or even months to complete the trip wearing the scallop shell which is still the symbol for this pilgrimage. However, over the centuries pilgrims became fewer and fewer although they never



ceased completely and in recent years numbers have increased dramatically with people making the journey for a variety of reasons. For some it is simply an exciting walking holiday amid the beautiful Galician countryside and for others it is a walk on which they can reflect on their spiritual life along the way.

Whatever the reason it is a walk on which they can take time to rediscover a quieter pace of life. It was Robert Louis Stevenson who said, 'It is better to travel hopefully than to arrive.' In our modern world we are all tempted to get somewhere rather than taking time to enjoy the journey. Deadlines have to be met, children picked up from school, tasks completed before the end of a busy day, even church business can become tasks that have to be finished before we feel we have done all that needs to be done. So the journey of a day becomes one long list of things that we feel we have to complete; places we think we have to reach. Pilgrimage then is a way to slow down and find time for thought, for reflection, for prayer. Walking too is a way of rediscovering a rhythm in which to do this which is why I think so many of us find peace and refreshment in walking.

Of course, we can't all head off to Spain on pilgrimage



but we can all take time to enjoy the journey. To stop being so driven by what must be done and to enjoy the walk. On the Emmaus Road the two disciples didn't recognise Jesus until later; they missed the Presence with them on the journey. Each day we walk with God; we just need to take the time to allow ourselves to become aware of his presence and to enjoy the journey.

#### **CHURCH TEAMS**

Bellie and Speymouth Church, despite not having a permanent Parish Minister, continues to flourish and in some ways, to grow. This is because we are blessed with a number of people in our church family who work quietly helping with various events in and around our church. Things don't just happen, they have to be organised and some events take a great deal of preparation – and sometimes, clearing up.



Being on a team can be a source of great satisfaction in that you are performing a service to the local community, making our church more vibrant, demonstrating the Christian spirit of service but above all, helping to spread God's Word within our community.

Some examples which we see:

The Welcome Teams – over the summer there have been several visitors to the church to worship with us on a Sunday. Almost without fail, these visitors have commented on the welcome they have received and the friendliness they have felt mixing with the congregation.

The Community Lunch Club – this continues to be a hugely successful venture with some twenty or so people enjoying not just the lunches but the time together, socialising with friends.

Bellie Babes – chaotic Friday mornings with kids playing together and some trying to escape from the hall while mums, dads, grannies, grandpas and other carers have some supportive time together.

Some examples we don't see:

The Property team – They work away trying to ensure the fabric of the buildings are maintained. This includes the gardens, paths dykes and all the other bits.

The Order of Service printing team – Each week they print out the Order of Service and distribute them to the places where they are handed out.

These are examples and there are several other teams without which our church would not operate as smoothly as it does.



However, some folk on these teams need help eg the Order of Service Team now has only three people. The more people who are on a team means less work for the individual members of the team. So come-on folks. Why not get involved? We need more helpers in almost all the teams, the Welcome Teams, the Sound Team, the OOS printing team are just some examples.





A big thank you to the Country Dance Group who raised a massive  $\pounds 222$  for Water Aid.






#### THE NEW BBC

The Bellie Book Club began in the Spring with our first meeting discussing a book in May. We meet once a month on the second Friday of the month.




The idea of the Book Club was thought of by Joan Jones to be a constructive and interesting way of keeping an open door to the church on a Friday afternoon.

We had a list supplied by the Elgin Library who have been very helpful in delivering them to Fochabers for us. We choose which books on the list to read.








Fellowship comes in many ways.







- 1. India has around 360 million people living in poverty.
- 2. 71 years Thanks to increased availability of healthcare, vaccinations, and better survival rates for babies and children, the average life expectancy has increased dramatically over the last 100years.
- 3. Road traffic accidents are the single biggest killers of young people over ten.
  In 2015, more than 1.2million adolescents died, and road injuries were to blame for about one in 10 of these deaths, according to reports published by the world health organisation.



- 4. Botswana is an upper-middle income country, and its education expenditure is among the highest in the world, at around 9% of GDP. (The UK spends about 5%). It is politically stable, with one of Africa's most advanced banking systems, and rich in natural resources, such as diamonds and uranium.
- 5. Decreased by 53%. The good news is that child mortality rates decreased by an amazing 53% between 1990 and 2015, thanks to things like vaccination programmes, better healthcare, and improved nutrition. (World Health Organisation).
- 6. 16 million. Bangladesh has made remarkable progress in lifting 16 million people out of extreme poverty over the last decade, and has reduced inequality significantly.
- 7. Norway. Norway is the most generous country in the world in terms of proportion of income spend on aid it spends 1.11% of its gross national income on aid and development programmes. The UK is committed to spending 0.7% of gross national income.
- 8. 89%. Of children are enrolled in primary school, according to 2014 World Bank Data, although the quality of education available varies hugely.
- 9. 2.4. Women now have on average 2.4 children. The biggest factors in this reduction are better living standards, decreased mortality rates and greater access to birth control.
- 10. Movies and films. Nigeria's film industry employs over one million people, and produces around 50 movies each week. It's known as Nollywood, and in 2014 the Nigerian government released data showing that it is a \$3.3 billion industry.


