### THE WIND OF THE SPIRIT

In different places throughout scripture, the Holy Spirit is described as a wind. In fact, it does so from the very beginning. The Bible opens with the famous verses, "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters."



The word "Spirit" here is "ru-ach" which comes from the word for wind. It implies the breath of God. Just as in the next chapter is goes on to say that God *breathed* life into Adam.

Then, in Ezekiel, the prophet has the vision of the valley of dry bones. God's power to bring restoration is pictured as a flowing wind. It moves through the hopeless valley, and rises up a great army, breathing life into them.

At Pentecost, when the Spirit came with power and rested on those gathered there, it all began with the sound of a rushing wind.

Then in John 3, we find Jesus using this same picture of wind to describe the moving of God's Spirit. He says, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. That which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be amazed that I said to you, 'You must be born again.' The wind blows where it wishes and you hear the sound of it, but do not know where it comes from and where it is going; so is everyone who is born of the Spirit."

This has become a popular image in trying to describe our invisible God. Just like the wind we can't see Him, but we can see His effects on the world. One of the easiest places to see the movement of the wind is in the trees around us. It's mesmerising to stare up at the swaying branches, and listening to the sound of thousands of leaves rustling against each other.

Just as we can't see the wind itself when we look up like that, so we can't see God physically. But we know He is there; we see Him at work in the world.



We can't control the Holy Spirit, and we can't see the Holy Spirit. But what we can do is allow ourselves to be moved and changed by Him.

I remember being quite inspired the first summer I was at the Celtic Kirk service at Speyfest. It was a lovely morning, and as we worshipped, the tent was being buffeted by the warm wind. It was as if God was making His presence known, showing His pleasure as His people from lots of different churches gathered to praise Him.

So that is my simple thought for this week. Perhaps the next time you notice the breeze moving before you, you will be reminded that God's presence, although unseen, is with you. His Holy Spirit lives within you because of Jesus' sacrifice for us on the cross.

#### **PRAYER**

Heavenly Father,

Thank you for the presence of your Holy Spirit in us. We pray that like the wind moves and shapes the world around us, that we would be moved and shaped by your will.

Breathe new life into us each day. At times where we feel like the dry bones of Ezekiel's vision, would you revive and renew us by your Spirit. Stand us up in your strength, and send us out to move with your kingdom.

We pray that we would see you at work in our community as easily as we see the wind moving in the trees.


(1533) Elizabeth 1 (English queen 1558-1603), (1917) Leonard Cheshire (pacifist), (1936) Buddy Holly (singer)


# **Churches reopening**
