The worship was followed by a fabulous buffet lunch and the new congregation was lively in the hall as we shared a magnificent spread – thanks to everyone who made all of this possible.

Most people will continue to serve the Church in some way even though we have had a constitutional change taking place too. Everyone was thanked for how they had served their former congregation. However there was an opportunity to say a special thank



you to four Elders for very long service and three of them retired having served their Lord devotedly as good and faithful servants. To Peter Cromar, Peter Dawson, Frank Low and George Nicol we said a special thank you.

There will no doubt be teething problems as we begin to arrange things a bit differently, taking into account all the new people that are coming together. We will all have to make an effort to get to know new names and faces and because we worship in two places that will take a bit of time. But if you find a new face sitting next to you or near to you, perhaps you could open a conversation by introducing yourself, rather than relying on the other person to speak to you – after all they may be a visitor and know no one. After the celebration lunch there were some cheery



folk clearing up and one said to me later, it was all a great start to something that is going to grow much bigger. Pray God that is true.

The Apostle Paul wrote,



"One thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus. All of us who are mature should take such a view of things." (Phil 3^{v_13-15})

According to the South American evangelist Peter Wagner, who spent 30 years as the wonderfully entitled 'Professor of Church Growth' "Goal setting is a risk. One of the most comfortable things in the world is to have no goals, because then there can be no failure. It is equally comfortable to define your goals in terms of what you happen to be doing at

any given time. If you shoot first, then draw the target around the bullet hole, you'll never miss the bull's eye. If someone looks later, he might even call you a good marksman."

Some people have developed this technique very well. Their goals are set more by their own inclinations than by carefully formulated biblical priorities.

Having a clearly defined goal is the first step towards the success of anything. However, according to motivational specialists only three percent of people have a major goal for their life. Without



this we are like a rudderless ship. Instead of our setting the direction of our life, we let the winds and tides of the times take us where they will. As someone has said facetiously, "Blessed be he who aims at nothing for he shall surely hit it!" As with the Apostle Paul, God has a specific goal for each one of us as well as for our new charge 'Bellie and Speymouth'.



TEAM ROMANIA 2015 SUBMITTED BY ISABEL MACLEOD

Things are starting to get exciting in the run up to our mission trip to Romania in July. The team will be 17-strong with 9 young people coming along. We are planning regular training sessions and preparation sessions to get our materials and programme ready. This time around we are to be leading the week ourselves and it will be



run very much in the same way as our own holiday club - it will just be 3 times a day, in extreme heat and with the added difficulty of a language barrier! Some of our number are to be learning to be puppeteers so that a visual presentation can be used to help overcome the problem of not speaking Romanian. Music is also a great universal language and the Romanians are keen on singing and music. As well as teaching sessions and craft sessions with the children we shall be working with them in the spare time, getting to know them, building up relationships with them and teaching games and sports too. It will be a full-on, busy and demanding week with many challenges but it will hopefully prove to be very rewarding and humbling for all of us.

How can YOU be a part of the mission project for 2015?

Please pray for the team as we prepare to take on this mission and continue to pray as we go. You can be involved as a prayer partner - watch out for details of this very soon! Your support and prayers are so important and really do make a huge difference.

After we have seen our Romanian friends in March when they visit us to let us know how things are progressing at the camp, we will be collecting items to take with us to Romania. This time around we are to be collecting small items of stationery and craft materials to take with us to use and to give to the folks there. Maybe a small item like a pencil or ruler could be donated or perhaps a small notepad or a packet of crayons etc. We will then

hopefully collate them into packs to be given out to the children. We will also hopefully collect toiletries and if you could provide a bar of soap, a facecloth or a toothbrush or some similar item then we will hopefully be able to make up packs with these too. We will not be collecting clothes this time since space is limited for transportation.

Thanks must go to all those who are faithful in their support of the whole project. The work there really does make a difference to many lives.

NEW CONGREGATIONAL TEAMS

Teams are Elder led which makes reporting to the Kirk Session straightforward.

As a minimum, each Team will meet 4 times per year, and some more often as their remits require. Teams are made up of Elders who serve for a three year term and may serve a second term before changing Team. The Kirk Session also appoints additional members of the Congregation to serve for a term of two years on a Team; appointed members can serve for three terms before stepping down or being invited to serve on another Team.

Thus, though we no longer have a Congregational Board under our new Unitary Constitution, we are still able to fully utilize the time and talents of our gifted congregational members.

BELLIE AND SPEYMOUTH YOUNG CHURCH SUBMITTED BY MARGARET MCINNES



CHURCH AND SOCIETY SUBMITTED BY JOHN MCCONNACHIE

The Church and Society Council of the Church of Scotland is charged with engaging in the national, political and social issues affecting Scotland and the world today. The Society brings reports to the General Assembly which allows the Church to form its policies on various issues. In the recent past, these issues have included violence against women, human trafficking, and competiveness in sport. Current themes being discussed include taxation, corporal punishment of children and various ethical issues surrounding climate change. The Council was heavily involved in the lead up to the Scottish Referendum in 2014 hosting and encouraging meetings all over the country as part of the Moderator's 'Respectful Dialogue'.

The Council is composed of a variety of women and men from various backgrounds including ministers, medical professionals, teachers, lawyers, engineers, and scientists. In some cases the council seeks advice from experts in the fields under discussions eg in the discussions on taxation, accountants specialising in taxation have been consulted.



In addition, the Council's Education Committee represents the Church on educational matters. The Council also runs Prison Visitor Centres including the new 'bus' at Cornton Vale near Stirling.

One busy part of the Council's work is with the Scottish Churches' Parliamentary Office where the staff maintain a close watch on the activities of the Scottish and UK Parliaments. The Church is frequently asked to comment on various bills under discussion or to comment on issues raised in both Holyrood and Westminster eg submissions were sought on the proposed legislation on the control of air guns, betting offices and the current bill on lobbying.

society. A good example of this was the booklet 'myths and lies we tell ourselves about the poor', a hard hitting document which presented a different view, perhaps a more Christian view, to that shown in the popular media – this report was sent to every MP and MSP; I wonder how many read it? Currently work is being done on an equally hard-hitting report on the 'sanctioning' of benefit claimants, how this is done and the effect this has on people.

The Council is not afraid of controversy both inside and outwith the Church. The report on the 'Children of Abraham' raised outrage from some parts of the Jewish Community but has led to a meaningful dialogue with both Jewish and Muslim leaders.

Being part of this Council is a great privilege but does involve some intense study to keep abreast of the issues under discussion. Some of the meetings are in Edinburgh but the Council meets twice a year for a two day session in Coatbridge. This involves working well into the evening, this year it was 9.15pm before we finished. In future issues of the magazine, I shall give more detail of some of the issues under discussion.

Details of the work being done by the council are available on the Church of Scotland website.
