Greetings from your Locum



When I was asked to write a short article for the church magazine I thought that you might, perhaps, like to know a wee bit about me. Hence the following 'potted' history. As a comedian once said, 'I was born at a very early age', in 1948 in fact, the eldest of a family of three. That was in Edinburgh where I grew up and attended school, as did my younger brother and sister. After leaving school I started work as an apprentice with what was then GPO Telephones, but is now B.T. During these years I also developed a love of

motorbikes which has never really left me although I know that I am safer on four wheels nowadays. It was at a Cafe frequented by motorcyclists that I met my future wife Jan who was a nurse at the nearby Eastern General Hospital. We married in her home town of Biggar in Lanarkshire in 1970 and have been blessed with two lovely daughters, two grand-daughters and a grandson.

Around 1980 I felt a call to the ministry and, after attending night-school to gain the necessary entrance qualifications, in 1982 I began studying for a Bachelor of Divinity at New College in Edinburgh. Which was quite a change for all the family as evidenced by our younger daughter who asked her mum, 'Mummy, when Daddy goes to university will they let him come home again?'

New College was a new experience for me as well and in my first lecture in Systematic Theology I remember thinking, 'I understand every word that man is saying but I haven't a clue what he is talking about!' Thankfully things became clearer and New College was a fantastic experience. As was training as a student for the ministry in which I began to discover some of the basics of being a parish minister. Which I became when I was ordained to Dulnain Bridge and Grantown on Spey in 1988 where I was privileged to be minister for over 25 years.

However, I mentioned my date of birth at the start and when my 65th birthday fell on a Sunday I decided to retire and make my birthday my last service. It was sad taking leave of so many friends and the folks we had known for so many years and Jan and I were both moved and humbled when so many folks came to the service and lunch afterwards. So we retired to Elgin where I discovered that retirement in the ministry certainly doesn't mean stopping work and I have been



invited to conduct worship in many of the churches in the Presbytery and now I am privileged to be your Locum. Jan and I have had a wonderful welcome from the congregation and I hope that in the months to come we can get to know one another better and discover the blessings of God's Word together.



CHRISTIAN AID HELEN MILLS, CHRISTIAN AID COORDINATOR

At this time of conflict in the Middle East, and at a time when many migrants from Africa are making a perilous journey across the sea to Europe, the demands on Christian Aid are enormous. Christian Aid is still supporting its work with projects that provide practical help to some of the poorest people in the world. It has, and still is, making a significant difference in lifting many poor people out of poverty. In recent years it has also mounted a major humanitarian effort to aid refugees from the Middle East who have been driven from their homes by war or religious extremism.

This is why your support for Christian Aid, at this time, is so important. The Harvest Collection for Bellie and Speymouth Congregations raised the magnificent sum of £622.97. This is in addition to the sum of £2,443.68 which

was raised during Christian Aid Week and £650.78 at Speyfest. The people of Fochabers and district have been most generous in their continuing support.

In my final year as Christian Aid Coordinator I would like the thank all those who made door to door collections for Christian Aid Week, those elders who distributed the harvest envelopes, and those helpers that



assisted in the counting of donations. I also want to thank all those who made the effort to gift aid their donations. The recovered tax will add significantly to the total sum received by Christian Aid.

Finally I would like to offer my best wishes to the new Christian Aid Coordinator, whoever he, or she, may be.

ECO NEWS AVRIL CLARK

Rag Bags

Our latest collection raised £179.60 which will be going towards the tower fund.



Moray Eco Network

The Moray Eco Network meets three times in the year and the meeting in September was by Grant Wilson from Moray Waste services. To motivate us to recycle more Grant shared the following information:

- The Moray Council area has one of the highest recycling rates at 56% of all waste collected
- The area generates 30-32,000 tonnes of waste to landfill a year 10 years ago this was 60,000 tonnes
- Analysis of average contents of landfill bin by weight shows that there is still much work to do. A total of 51% of what goes to landfill could be recycled ie:

36% food waste (a significant amount of this is unopened and in date!) 4% plastics (type 1&2, which can be recycled) and cans

9% paper and card2% glass bottles and jars

- Plastics: only types 1 and 2 can consistently be recycled. The market for other types of plastic is volatile and demand varies for Type 5 (yoghurt pots, marg tubs etc) so Moray Council has decided not to collect for recycling at present.
- Contents of the brown bin is recycled by Keenan Recycling, who operate the UK's biggest "in-vessel" digester
- Plastics are sent to Waste Watchers in Lossiemouth for sorting, baling and reprocessing
- Enough waste gas is generated from landfill in the area to supply a town the size of Fochabers
- Bin lorry crews empty between 1100 1300 bins a day (approx 26 tonnes in weight)!
- Putting the wrong materials in the wrong bins costs Council Tax payers £1.2 million a year (£3,000 a day). This includes £82 / tonne in Landfill Tax.
- Moray Council non-recyclable waste actually goes to a "landraise" site, which is an old airfield at Nether Dallachy near Spey Bay. It was first used for landfill in 1993 and it is the only Council operated site currently in use in Moray. At the current rate of disposal it could be at capacity by 2025.
- The Council aims to have a recycling rate of 95% by 2025.

Climate Justice

This December political leaders from around the world will meet in Paris for the 21st climate conference to conclude negotiations for a new global deal to tackle climate change and address its impact. Scottish Christians have an important part to play in telling our leaders that we care about the climate and God's creation. Not only do we have a duty to our brother and sisters around the world who are suffering the impacts, but we are stewards of God's creation and must look after it. By signing the petition we have shown that Bellie and Speymouth support Climate Justice.

The Traidcraft Table

You will have noticed at Bellie we have had the Traidcraft table out every Sunday in the run up to Christmas. Although we won't be ordering in December we have crafts and some of the display cards that can be purchased. So do your last minute shopping with us. We have been getting the Traidcraft table out and about more recently and in the New Year we would like to continue with this. So if you are involved in any groups out with the Church and would like us to come along with the Traidcraft goods just speak to any of the Eco Team. Our other plan is to have more catalogues available so browsing and ordering can be easier. We will also do Party plan evenings if you want to have a group of friends round.

Meat Free Monday's (or any day you prefer)

For this edition I have asked Sue Pianta-Scott to write a short bit and give us a recipe to try.

Christmas Dinner

It's that time of year again! Both wonderful and daunting when it comes to 'vegetarian, guests to feed.

I am <u>Pescatarian</u>, that is, I eat fish but no meat from animal, bird or fowl. A <u>Vegetarian</u> eats no meat at all.

A <u>Vegan</u> eats nothing from animal, so no dairy products, no meat and no honey.

So here are a couple of recipes that can be prepared in advance and will please all three!

First up is: Imam Bayildi (a Turkish dish said to make a prince swoon!)

This is my version and can be served with roast vegetables (cooked in oil of course, not animal fat).

Ingredients: 2 large aubergines 1 large onion sliced and cut into small pieces

2 cloves garlic 1 tin chopped tomatoes 1 tsp garam masala 1/2 tsp ground ginger

1/4 tsp chopped chillies (or more if you like) 1/2 cup olive oil

Method: Half the aubergines lengthways and scoop out the flesh leaving about a ¼ inch thickness of shell.

Pop the shells in an oven tray coated with olive oil in the oven 200c for about ten minutes. While aubergines in oven, gently cook the onion, add the flesh of the aubergine (cut into small pieces), add crushed garlic, garam masala, ginger and chillies. Cook until onions and aubergine soft and all mixed in and then add tomatoes.

Season to taste. Put the aubergine shells into an ovenproof dish and scoop the mixture into them.

Pop the dish into the oven 200c for about 20 minutes until all bubbling on top and a wee bit brown. This will keep for a couple of days in the fridge and the flavours improve I think. Just reheat on Christmas Day.

Luxury Nut Roast

This may sound unimaginative, but believe me you can make it very special and our vegetarian family member just loves it and her meat eating partner always has some too!

Ingredients: 8 oz (25gram) Mixed nuts using cashew, walnuts, pecan, brazil

1 medium onion, chopped finely 4 oz (100g) Wholemeal bread ½ pint (300ml) Vegetable stock 1 tsp Vecon or yeast extract

1/2 tsp mixed herbs 1 oz (25 g) butter 1/2 tsp paprika tomato puree

Method: Saute the onions in the butter until transparent. Grind the nuts and bread in food mixer or liquidizer until fine. Add all the ingredients together, mix well. Turn into greased loaf tin (1lb or 450g) and bake at 180c for 30 minutes. I line my tin with greaseproof paper or use a silicon one which never sticks. Pop a sprig of holly on to decorate and there we are.

If I could travel to anywhere in the world it would be back to Dubai in October. The sunshine and warm temperatures certainly agreed with me and were very therapeutic.


If I was to create a piece of art, the subject would be...Bennachie. I carry a photograph of the hill with me wherever I go.




